GREEN WASTE KERBSIDE COLLECTIONS START SOON



Keep a look out in 2017 for more information about the roll out to the rest of Tuggeranong.

More than 5,000 homes in Weston Creek and Kambah have said yes to a new green waste kerbside collection service starting this month.

If you have ordered your bin you should have already received it. Kerbside collections will be fortnightly.

If you live in Kambah and haven't yet ordered a bin, you can do it online and pay a small one-off fee of \$50 (free for concession card holders).

There will be no changes to the self-haul green waste services at West Belconnen and Mugga Lane Resource Management Centres.

MODERNISING ANKETELL & GARTSIDE STREETS



The courtyard next to the Hyperdome on Anketell Street is getting a fresh new look and upgrade.

The improvements will farewell tired looking street furniture and welcome a more spacious and inviting entry to the community square.

The design is based on the feedback gathered from a community consultation last year. Work starts this month.

On Gartside Street in Erindale, verge improvements and parking and traffic upgrades will make this popular street safer and more people friendly.

CBR GETS INTERESTED IN HAIG PARK'S FUTURE

Over the past two months Canberrans have provided more than 400 ideas for Haig Park, which will be used to influence a plan for its future use.
