## ACT Public Health Services Quarterly Performance Report

January to March 2022





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#### About the Quarterly Performance Report

This report provides information about how our public health system is performing. The report includes information on the following services:

- · Community-based care
  - Walk-in Centres
- Hospital-based care
  - Emergency Departments, surgery, admitted patients

Comparisons between years for the Quarterly Performance Reports should be undertaken with caution due to unprecedented health events that have occurred since 2019.

Of most significance has been the impact of COVID-19, which the ACT health system moved swiftly to address. The outbreaks in March 2020, August 2021 and since late December 2021, have had a significant impact on the way that our health system has had to operate and the demand for certain services. Walk-in Centre and Community Health Centre staff and sites have been redeployed to focus on COVID-19 testing. There was a suspension of all non-essential surgeries across the ACT in MarchApril 2020 and again at Calvary Public Hospital Bruce in January to February 2022. The ACT Government delivered a record number of surgeries in 2020-21 as part of the COVID-19 recovery project and has committed to delivering 60,000 elective surgeries over the four years from 2021-22. In Quarter 3, 2021-22, Calvary Public Hospital Bruce commenced a subcontracting arrangement with Calvary Bruce Private Hospital to increase surgery completions.

Improving timely, safe and sustainable care across the ACT is a key priority for the ACT Government. We aim to be the safest health care system in Australia, delivering high quality, patient-centred care for Canberrans.

Data management is integral to running an informed hospital and health care system that is accountable, transparent and responsive. It is also key to improving health service performance to ensure better access to timely, safe and sustainable care, a key focus for the community and the ACT Government.

Each quarterly report provides a snapshot of the latest available health activity and performance information as at the date of reporting.

The report covers activity at three public hospitals in the ACT: the Canberra Hospital, Calvary Public Hospital Bruce and the University of Canberra Hospital.

Due to the nature of health data and the reliance on coding, validation and quality assurance of clinical information, there may be slight variations in the numbers presented for the same quarter in the previous or a subsequent quarterly report.

It is standard practice in the sector for data to reflect the most up-to-date information, and for revised data to be submitted in reporting cycles; it is a practice that is acknowledged by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, the Independent Hospital Pricing Authority, and the National Health Funding Body.

For these reasons, there may also be slight differences between data reported in the annual report and the numbers presented across quarterly reports, respectively, for the same year.

The ACT Health Directorate is pleased to provide this report that gives the community a snapshot of our health system each quarter.

Due to difference in size, peer group and the nature of services provided at each hospital, direct comparison may not be valid.




#### Health care in Canberra

#### ACT public health services receive very positive feedback on the care they provide.

These results demonstrate the quality of care in the ACT's public health system and are testament to staff working to provide care 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. However, we can always find areas to improve, and meaningful consumer data and feedback are key to this.



#### New central service to help people with eating disorders

The ACT Eating Disorders Clinical Hub opened in January 2022 as a central referral point for ACT public eating disorder services and as a way to refocus eating disorder management away from acute inpatient treatment towards a more flexible, appropriate, and efficient treatment approach.

The new clinical hub provides a central intake point so people can be referred to services that best support their needs and to help manage their condition.

The hub supports a range of coordinated eating disorder services for children, adolescents, and adults and works closely with service providers in the territory, with the aim of supporting consistent information about referral pathways, care escalation and treatment options, including hospital-based services and outreach programs.

Coordination of resources, services and expertise in eating disorders across the ACT means people experiencing or impacted by eating disorders will have better access to support, including assessment, treatments options, advice, education, training, services and referrals.

The hub provides assessment, coordination, and service support rather than directly providing treatment or an ongoing therapy service. It also offers advice, consultation, networking, and support for clinicians working with people who have eating disorders.

The service is made up of multi-disciplinary mental health professionals who work within a recovery and person-centred framework. During the intake and assessment process for the Hub, clients will have access to a trained clinician who will help determine the best services for their individual circumstances. Staff will assist the clients in accessing the appropriate services to best help them with their recovery.



# Walk-in Centres and COVID-19 Testing Centres

Nurse-led Walk-in Centres provide free efficient access to treatment and health advice for one-off, non-urgent injuries and illness. Patients requiring urgent attention for serious injury or illness are directed to Emergency Departments.

- ➡ Walk-in Centre presentations increased by 13.6% in Quarter 3, 2021-22 compared to Quarter 2, 2021-22.
- ♣ Presentations at ACT Government COVID-19 Testing Centres decreased by 37.2% from Quarter 2, 2021-22 to 99,590 in Quarter 3, 2021-22.
- 83.3% of presentations received treatment at the Walk-in Centres, while 7.1% of presentations were redirected to an Emergency Department.



#### Walk-in Centres and ACT Government COVID-19 Testing Centres





All Walk-in Centres (WiC) are led by a team of highly skilled advanced practice nurses and nurse practitioners with extensive experience in treating people with minor injuries and illnesses. During Quarter 3, 2021-22, there were six Walk-in Centres operated across the ACT, including a dedicated COVID-19 clinic at Garran Surge Centre that opened in January 2022. The Inner North Walk-in Centre was temporarily closed on 9 January to focus resources on the COVID-19 clinic.

During Quarter 3 2021-22, PCR COVID-19 testing decreased significantly at ACT Government-operated testing clinics. This was due to a national shortage of the testing reagent from 14-25 January, the increasing availability of Rapid Antigen Tests to the public throughout the quarter, and decreases in demand due to changes in other jurisdictions' border restrictions. The ACT Government also distributed over 53,000 RATs through its COVID-19 testing clinics during the quarter, most of these during the reagent shortage.

A new testing site opened in Mitchell on 18 December 2021 to allow EPIC to resume normal operations. A dedicated COVID-19 Clinic at the Garran Surge Centre temporarily opened on 10 Jan 2022 for people who have tested positive for COVID-19 and need non-urgent care. West Belconnen Centre, Kambah Drive through Clinic and Roaming COVID-19 Clinics have been removed from the above data table due to no data being reported in the preceding three reporting periods. Kambah Drive through Clinic is being operated by a private pathology provider on behalf of ACT Government.

ACT public hospital Emergency Departments (EDs) are open to everyone, providing triage, assessment and treatment for patients suffering from a range of medical conditions as well as providing life-saving care for acutely unwell patients.


- **★** There were 34,986 presentations to EDs in Quarter 3, 2021-22.
- ◆ 52.1% of patients received treatment within the clinically recommended time for their urgency (triage) category.
- **★** 53.3% of patients spent four hours or less in EDs.







### **Admitted Patient Care**

The ACT has some of the nation's highest quality health care services and facilities, including three public hospitals.

Admitted patients are patients who are admitted to a hospital for care. This does not include Emergency Department patients, outpatients or other non-admitted patients treated on the hospital site.


- **★** 1,360 babies were born at ACT public hospitals in Quarter 3, 2021-22 6.5% more than Quarter 2, 2021-22.

# **Elective Surgery**

Public elective surgery is provided at Canberra Hospital, Calvary Public Hospital Bruce and a number of private provider facilities in the ACT under contract with Canberra Health Services.

◆ During Quarter 3, 2021-22, there were 3,063 elective surgeries performed during a period where category 2 and 3 elective surgeries were suspended at Calvary Public Hospital Bruce (CPHB) due to COVID-19 from 10 January 2022 to 21 February 2022.





#### **Elective Surgery**



There are three main urgency categories for elective surgery: urgent, semi-urgent and non-urgent. The urgency category is determined by the surgeon and is based on clinical criteria. While the Canberra Hospital is the major tertiary referral centre for the region, both the Canberra Hospital and Calvary Public Hospital Bruce provide care to people from the ACT, the surrounding NSW region as well as other patients from interstate. The results below provide information on all public elective surgery performed in the ACT.
