This publication presents the results from the ACT public school census conducted on Friday 1 August 2025.

Key findings include that:

- there were 50,292 enrolments – an increase of 133 enrolments compared with February 2025.
- there was increase of 185 enrolments in preschool and a decrease of 270 enrolments in year 12 compared to February 2025.
- there were 2,449 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander enrolments, 27 more than in February 2025.

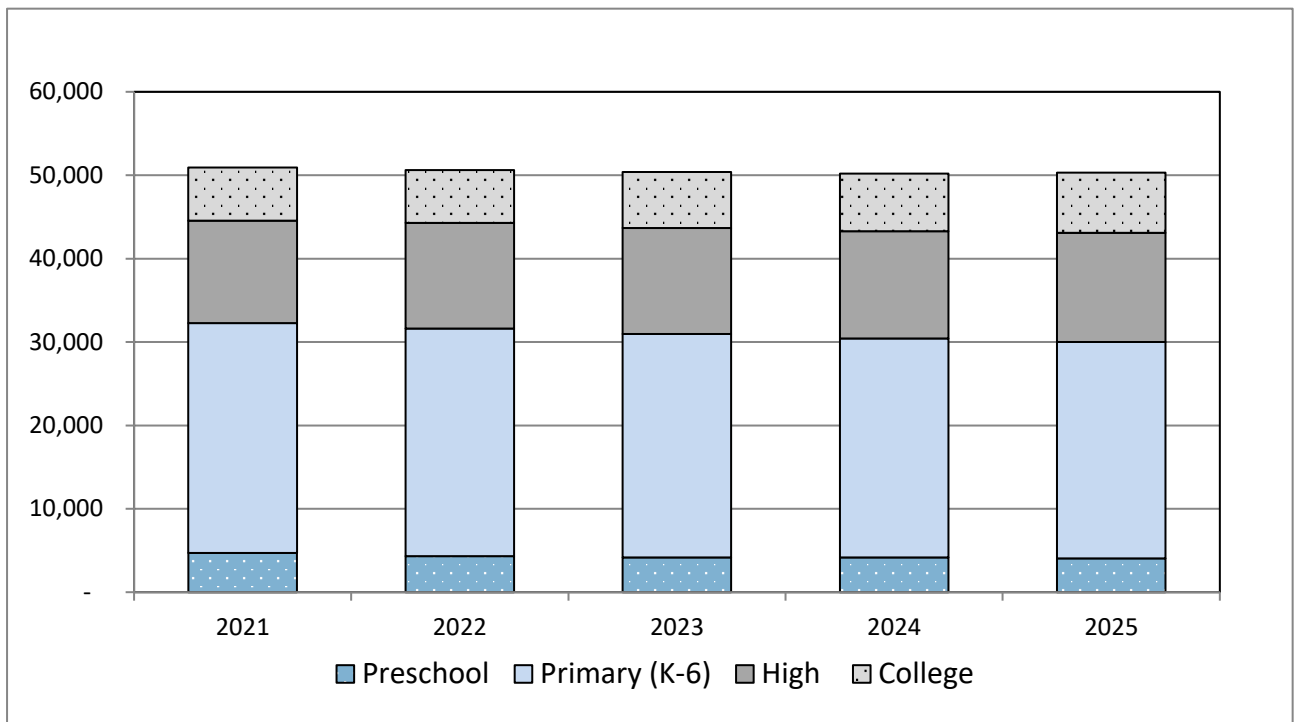
Student enrolments

In August 2025, there were 50,292 enrolments in public schools in the ACT, equivalent to an increase of 96 students (0.2%) compared with August 2024 ([see Table 1](#) and [Table 2](#)).

At the 2025 August school census, primary school enrolments decreased compared with August 2024 while high school and college level enrolments increased (see Figure 1). There were:

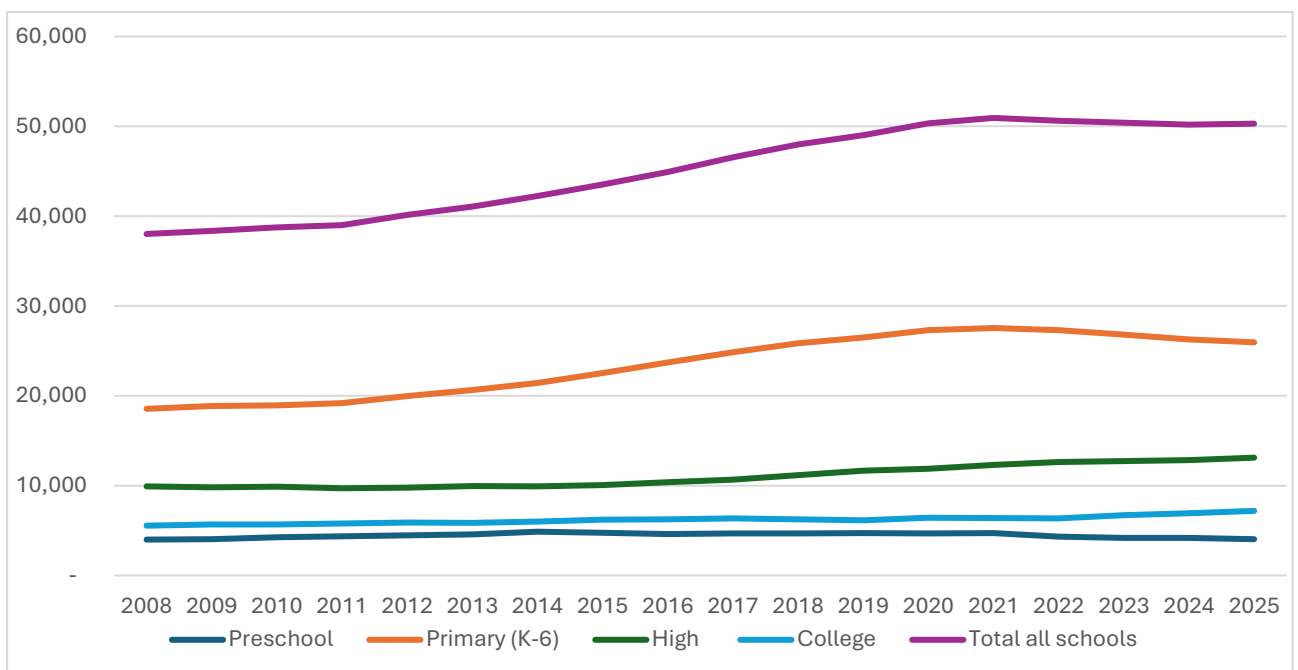
- 29,991 primary school level enrolments, a decrease of 450 enrolments (1.5%) since August 2024 (see Table 2).
- preschool enrolments decreased by 138 students (3.3%) from 4,183 to 4,045 students.
- kindergarten to year 6 enrolments decreased by 312 students (1.2%), from 26,258 to 25,946 students.
- 13,112 high school level enrolments, an increase of 271 enrolments (2.1%) since August 2024.
- 7,189 college level enrolments, an increase of 275 enrolments (4.0%) since August 2024.

ACT public school enrolments have recently stabilised following a period of sustained growth that began around 2011 (see Figure 2). Since 2022, overall enrolments have decreased slightly (less than 1% annually). This modest decrease reflects a slight increase in high school and college enrolments offset by reductions in preschool and primary school enrolments over the same period.

Student enrolments: by Indigenous status

As of the 2025 August school census, there were 2,449 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students enrolled, representing 4.9% of total enrolments ([see Table 3](#)). Compared with August 2024, this represented an increase of 64 enrolments (2.7%), including an increase of 32 primary school level enrolments and 59 high school level enrolments.

Enrolments decreased with increasing age for all students, with the majority of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students enrolled in primary schools (1,209), followed by high schools (636) and colleges (244) in August 2025 ([see Table 4](#)).

At the same time, there were 138 students enrolled in Koori preschool programs, with 82 children attending both Koori and universal preschool programs. This represented an increase of 14 enrolments (11%) compared with August 2024 and an increase of 41 enrolments (42%) since August 2021 ([See Table 5](#)).

Student enrolments: in disability education programs

As of the August 2025 census, there were 3,085 enrolments accessing disability education programs at either mainstream or specialist public schools ([see Table 6](#)), representing 6.1% of all enrolments. This was an increase of 104 enrolments (3.5%) since August 2024 and an increase of 206 enrolments (7.2%) since August 2021.

Student enrolments: by level of schooling and school network

As at August 2025 census, primary school enrolments were highest in the North/Gungahlin network (31%) followed by South/Weston (28%), Belconnen (25%), and Tuggeranong (16%) ([See Table 7](#)).

High school enrolments were highest in the North/Gungahlin network (31%) followed by South/Weston (29%), Belconnen (25%), and Tuggeranong (15%) ([see Table 8](#)).

College enrolments were highest in the South/Weston network (30%) followed by North/Gungahlin (27%), Belconnen (23%), and Tuggeranong (20%) ([see Table 9](#)).

Data on the distribution of student enrolments by schooling level, network and school is provided in Tables 7 to 9.

Student to teacher ratio

The student to teacher ratio takes account of all teaching resources allocated to support students. Students to teacher ratios were calculated by dividing the total Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) students by the FTE teaching staff. Overall, the students to teacher ratio for the ACT public school system was 12.7 ([see Table 10](#)). Compared with August 2021, the student to teacher ratio has decreased by 4.5%.

Non-school education

In the ACT, there are alternative educational pathways for students to undertake school level courses other than by attending a public or non-government school. As at the August 2025 census:

- 636 children and young people were home educated, an increase of 7.8% since August 2025.
- 160 students who were of school age were undertaking school equivalent courses at the Canberra Institute of Technology in August 2025, an increase of 40% since August 2024 and a decrease of 12 enrolments (7.0%) since August 2021.
- 26 ACT students were enrolled in the NSW Finigan School of Distance Education.

Explanatory Notes

Reference date

This census of enrolments was conducted on Friday 1 August 2025.

Scope and coverage

The August census includes all ACT public schools providing primary, secondary and specialist education. Jervis Bay School is included in ACT public primary schools because the ACT Education Directorate administers the Jervis Bay School for the Australian Government under a service agreement.

Collection

ACT public school census data was electronically downloaded from the Directorate's centralised administrative system.

Student enrolments

The census included students who were officially enrolled in a school on census day and who were active in a primary, secondary or specialist education program at that school. Students who were absent without an authorised explanation for more than four continuous school weeks prior to census date were excluded.

Primary school level

The primary school level of schooling included students from preschool to year 6, unless 'K-6' was specified. Preschool included three, four, and five-year-old children who were enrolled in a school prior to starting kindergarten. Preschool level data also included students who were attending a preschool program as an early entry student. Please note, children can be enrolled in more than one preschool program.

High school level

The high school level of schooling is equivalent to the lower secondary level of education of the Australian Standard Classification of Education and includes students in years 7, 8, 9 and 10. A small number of year 10 students undertake early access programs at Erindale and Gungahlin colleges.

College level

The college level of schooling is equivalent to the senior secondary level of education of the Australian Standard Classification of Education and includes students in years 11 and 12 as well as those students defined as older.

Older students (O)

Students in public schools aged 18 years by 31 December in the year prior to the commencement of their college studies, were classified as Older (O).

Flexible education

The census included students who were participating in Flexible Education. Flexible Education provides alternative education options across 5 campuses. These campuses include the Muliyan Program, the Cottage, Hospital School, Murrumbidgee School and Distance Education. Students attending Flexible Education sites were counted in the census at their mainstream school, except for the number of students who were enrolled in the NSW Finigan School of Distance Education which is listed separately in the Non-school education section in this report.

Introductory English Centres

Introductory English Centres (IECs) are for students who require intensive full-time English language instruction. There were five IECs in the primary sector, conducted at Charnwood-Dunlop School (Belconnen Primary IEC), Franklin School (Gungahlin Primary IEC), Hughes Primary School (Southside IEC), North Ainslie Primary School (Northside IEC), and Wanniasa Hills Primary School (Tuggeranong Primary IEC). There was one IEC in the secondary sector, conducted at Dickson College (Secondary IEC).

Students enrolled in disability education programs

The Census included students who met the ACT Student Disability Criteria. These students accessed disability education programs at either mainstream or specialist public schools.

There are 4 specialist schools in Canberra; Black Mountain School, Cranleigh School, Malkara School, and The Woden School. Specialist schools cater for students with a moderate to profound intellectual disability, severe Autism Spectrum Disorder or with multiple disabilities that require intensive levels of support.
