Staying Connected to General Practice in Dark Hospital Times! Mentoring Students to Stay Inspired & Connected to Primary Care Practitioners During Their Prevocational Years

Introduction

Capital Health Network (CHN), in conjunction with the Academic Unit of General Practice at the Australian National University Medical School (ANUMS) are excited to have started a new GP scholarship program for medical students. This scholarship is designed to support ANU medical students in <u>staying connected to GP mentors</u> in the final year of medical school and subsequent junior doctor years.

The scholarship facilitates <u>two formal mentoring events</u> during fourth year and the <u>ability to attend a GP conference</u> with all expenses paid up to \$2000. The program is designed to support the local emerging workforce and bolster general practitioners in the ACT to create a more sustainable workforce into the future.
