Canberra households can now register for information about a zero-interest loan up to \$15,000 to invest in rooftop solar panels, household battery storage, zero emission vehicles and efficient electric appliances.

She replaced her home's gas ducted heating with a reverse cycle system and included solar as part of this switch.

"Our heating costs have halved, and the house is more comfortable to live in," Janet said.

One year into COVID-19

March marks 12 months since Canberra recorded its first active case of COVID-19.

Bronte Morgan was the fourth ACT resident to be diagnosed with the virus.

One year on, the 24-year-old continues to battle fatigue, joint and muscle pain, as well as an unwavering “brain fog”.

“It’s almost offensive, to be honest, when I hear people complaining about the rules or thinking they’re above them and not wanting to comply,

because if I had that chance, I would’ve done what I could to avoid getting it,” she said.

Let’s keep CBR safe and strong. Remember to keep your physical distance, practise good hand hygiene, and get tested if you have any COVID-19 symptoms.

COVID-19 vaccine rollout

The first batches of the COVID-19 vaccine are for those at greatest risk of exposure and those most vulnerable to COVID-19.

This includes quarantine and border workers, health care workers in high-risk exposure and transmission areas, and residents and staff of aged care and disability residential care facilities.

The ACT Government is working closely with the Australian Government to make sure everyone in the ACT has access to safe, effective and free COVID-19 vaccines.

Streamlining newborn registrations

The ACT Government is taking part in a pilot program to make it easier for parents to register their newborns.

Through the program, parents will only need to provide their child’s details once through a digital system to enrol and register for multiple government services. The first step of the pilot will streamline Medicare enrolment. The full pilot is expected to roll out by mid-2022.

The ACT Budget 2020-21 included funds to progress the initial design and planning work for a new tennis centre in Amaroo, which will take around 12 months to complete.

The centre will include up to 12 full-sized tennis courts with amenities including LED floodlighting, two hotshots' courts and a pavilion.

The centre will also be capable of holding major tennis events in Canberra.

Well Station Drive park and ride underway

Construction will start soon on a new park and ride facility on the south-eastern corner of Well Station Drive and Flemington Road.

Once complete, Gungahlin residents will be able to park their cars and catch the light rail to their destination.

It will provide car parking for more than 150 vehicles as well as bike and ride facilities.

Construction is expected to be completed in the second half of the year.

Cleaner, quieter buses for Canberra

The ACT Government's transition to a zero-emission bus fleet by 2040 is well underway. Canberrans can expect to see the first of the 90 electric buses hitting the streets next year.

The 34 remaining orange diesel buses left in the fleet are also being phased out and replaced with new buses in the second part of this year. These buses will be wheelchair and pram accessible.

More trees for Canberra

More than 6,300 trees were planted across Canberra last year, and thousands will be planted this year.

The ACT Government is continuing to grow the city's urban forest and by 2023-24 you will see a flourish of green across Canberra with 54,000 trees being planted.

Planting locations will focus on areas where there aren't many trees or where existing trees are ageing or dying.

- increased ability to restrict people who pose an unacceptable risk to vulnerable people

 - a nationally consistent approach to protecting vulnerable people.
