
Requirements for the authorisation of Electroconvulsive Therapy (ECT)

DEFINITIONS	ACAT is the ACT Civil & Administrative Tribunal			
	Electroconvulsive Therapy (ECT) means a procedure for the induction of an epileptiform convulsion in a person			
	Electroconvulsive therapy order means an order made by the ACAT for the administration of ECT			
ADVICE	ECT may be given to a person with or without decision making capacity. However, ECT cannot be administered to a person under 12 years of age.			
	The various pathways for seeking consent to administer ECT are explained in the following attachments:

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Attachment 1 - Emergency ECT application criteria and process


- ACAT can authorise maximum of 3 ECT treatments and the order is for a stated number of days, although a maximum of 7.
- An emergency ECT order cannot be made for a person under 16 years of age.



If between 16-18 years, application for ECT must be supported by a child and adolescent psychiatrist

Attachment 2 - Administration of ECT – person has decision-making capacity AND consents





Application for ECT must be supported by a child and adolescent psychiatrist

- * Consent must be in writing and witnessed by two people other than:
- The person seeking to obtain consent
- The doctor who is proposing to conduct ECT
