New & improved playgrounds




Kids and families across Canberra will soon benefit from new and improved playgrounds across our city.

60 a day treated at Walk-in Centre



More than 60 Tuggeranong residents every day are receiving treatment and health advice at the Tuggeranong Walk-in Centre.

People are making use of the centre in Greenway from when it opens at 7.30am until it closes at 10pm, getting access to treatment at a time that suits them.

Walk-in Centres provide free treatment of minor injuries and illness. Open every day, including Christmas & New Year's Day, and you don't need an appointment.

Tuggeranong waterways underway

Work will finish soon on three ACT Healthy Waterways projects in Tuggeranong.

The rain gardens in Wanniassa and Fadden and the pond in Kambah are expected to be completed in February, with some planting to take place in autumn.

Planting is already finished at three sites, the wetlands at Isabella Pond, the rain garden at Isabella Plains and the waterway restoration at Monash.

The projects will improve the quality of water flowing into our waterways and downstream into the Murrumbidgee River system.
