


Sporting events go plastic-free

More nurses coming to Canberra public hospitals



More nurses are being recruited to guarantee nursing and midwifery staffing levels on public hospital wards.

Message from the Chief Minister



The ACT is one of the first Australian jurisdictions to introduce nurse-to-patient ratios in our hospitals.

These ratios will improve the care you and your family members will receive at our hospitals, and improve

occupational safety and job satisfaction for our nurses and healthcare professionals.

With the implementation of these ratios, ACT hospitals have recruited more than 50 nurses this year, with a further 40 nurses to be employed by mid-year.

The upgrades at the Intensive Care Unit at the Canberra Hospital are now complete, providing eight additional beds. Work is also set to get underway in April on a new look emergency department at the Hospital to support our growing city.

Bigger ICU open at Canberra Hospital

The expanded intensive care unit is now open at the Canberra Hospital and a new-look emergency department is coming soon.

Stamp duty savings

Homebuyers wanting to purchase off-the-plan properties under \$600,000 will no longer pay stamp duty from April 1 2022, saving buyers up to \$15,720. This will continue to support owner occupiers at the most affordable end of the market.



Local playground upgrades

Head online to have your say on a playground upgrade in Ngunnawal, which forms part of Canberra's biggest ever suburban infrastructure program.

A further 11 playgrounds across Gungahlin will also receive upgrades in the coming months, including in Nicholls, Palmerston and Ngunnawal.

This will include a mixture of landscaping, fresh paint and additional mulch or softfall material.

New high school coming to Taylor

Work has started on the design of a new state-of-the-art high school in Taylor and a head contractor for the construction has been appointed. The high school – due to open in 2024 – will be located next to Margaret Hendry School and accommodate up to 800 students.

Its facilities will include general and specialist learning areas, a library and interactive learning centre, as well as performing arts spaces, hardcourts and a large multipurpose hall.

The school's design will take inspiration from the surrounding grassy woodlands and seasonal changes.



Casey to get new community park

Gungahlin locals are invited to contribute to the design of a new community recreation park in Casey.

The park will provide a wide range of outdoor recreation opportunities and contribute to the health and wellbeing of local residents.
