1. Overview

SYNERGY is the Nursing and Midwifery Research Centre based at The Canberra Hospital and is an acknowledgement by the ACT Health Directorate and the University of Canberra (UC) of the need to support a research culture that encourages engagement and collaboration, achieves regular outputs in key focus areas, enhances collaboration with key stakeholders, establishes international links with other centres, and develops a string and successful cohort of higher degree research students.

Three areas of research focus have been identified as current strengths based on research outcomes including publications in refereed journals, research income and higher degree student enrolments and capacity, and on the status and reputations of the researchers working in those areas:

- Mental Health Nursing and Psychosocial Wellbeing
- Midwifery/Women Centred Care
- Health workforce, Education and Quality Outcomes.

Vision:

To become a nationally and internationally recognised centre in research that contributes to the quality, articulation, and recognition of the nursing and midwifery professions and the translation of research findings into practice, education, and policy.

Professor Deborah Davis

Professor of Midwifery, Clinical Chair - University of Canberra and ACT Health Directorate



Professor Deborah Davis (BN, MNS, PhD) is a Clinical Chair and Professor of Midwifery - a joint appointment by the ACT Government, ACT Health Directorate and the University of Canberra's Faculty of Health. Professor Davis is a midwife with an extensive career in clinical practice (midwifery-led, continuity models of care), midwifery education and research. She is also active in the profession, having served for four years on the Board of Directors for the Australian College of Midwives, two of which were in the role of Vice President. Professor Davis is committed to improving maternity

services for childbearing women, through midwifery education, research, and service development. She has contributed chapters to pre-eminent midwifery textbooks, co-developed the world's first midwifery Massive Open Online Course (MOOC) on evidence-based practice, published extensively in scholarly journals, and plays a leadership role in service development in the ACT. Professor Davis' research interests focus on promoting wellness in childbearing women using salutogenic approaches, particularly in relation to birth environment and weight gain in pregnancy.

Professor Catherine Paterson

Professor of Nursing, Clinical Chair - University of Canberra and ACT Health Directorate



Professor Catherine Paterson (PhD, BA, MSc, PGCert. LTA, FHEA) is a Clinical Chair and Professor of Nursing - a joint appointment by the ACT Government, ACT Health Directorate and the University of Canberra's Faculty of Health. Professor Paterson conducts research in all areas of urology and uro-oncology. She has expertise in conducting systematic reviews, ecological momentary assessment methodology, mixed methods, complex interventions, and clinical trials. Professor Paterson has over 17 years' experience working in health services research, has published widely, and supervises HDR students.

Professor Michael Roche

Professor of Mental Health Nursing, Clinical Chair – University of Canberra and ACT Health Directorate



Dr Michael Roche (RN, PhD, FACN) is a Clinical Chair and Professor of Mental Health Nursing - a joint appointment by the ACT Government, ACT Health Directorate and the University of Canberra's Faculty of Health. Dr Roche has a wide-ranging research portfolio in mental health and health services using quantitative, multi-, and mixed- methods, including studies that have integrated longitudinal and cross-sectional data to provide new insights. His recent work has focused on professional pathways for mental health nurses, nurse resilience and retention, mental health safety culture, and workplace violence. He also has wide experience in clinical environments, education, information technology, and management positions in the public mental health system. He has attracted substantial research funding and has many publications,

book chapters, conference presentations, and reports. He emphasises collaboration and engagement in his work and mentors new researchers across clinical and academic settings. He presently supervises research students exploring aspects of mental health nursing, person-centred care, resilience, workplace violence, and restrictive practices.

Mr Anthony Dombkins

ACT Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer – ACT Health Directorate



Anthony Dombkins is the ACT Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer, a position he has held since January 2020. Previously the Director of Nursing and Midwifery, Northern Sydney Local Health District, Anthony graduated as a Registered Nurse in 1987 and holds postgraduate clinical certificates in Renal and Transplantation Nursing and Intensive Care Nursing, as well as a Masters, Health Management (UNE). Anthony has held a variety of senior health management positions within the public and private health sectors across NSW. In June 2014, Anthony was appointed an Adjunct Professor, Nursing with the University of Sydney and the Australian Catholic University. Anthony was also a member of the Clinical Excellence Commission Advisory Board and a Board Director for Stewart House.

Professor Michelle Lincoln

Executive Dean, Faculty of Health - University of Canberra



Professor Michelle Lincoln (B App Sci, PhD, FSPA, PFHEA) is the Executive Dean of the Faculty of Health, University of Canberra. Professor Lincoln was formerly the Deputy Dean, Associate Dean Learning and Teaching and the Head of Discipline of Speech Pathology in the Faculty of Health Sciences, University of Sydney. She was the inaugural chair of the Asia Pacific Education Collaboration in Speech Pathology. Professor Lincoln's research in education is focused on competency-based assessment in clinical settings, clinical education models, ethical development and interprofessional learning. She writes on and researches allied health service delivery and workforce, particularly in rural, remote and Indigenous communities. Professor Lincoln's research has been funded by the National Health and Medical Research Council, the Australian Research

Council and the NSW Government. She has published more than 130 peer-reviewed journal papers as well as books and book chapters. Professor Lincoln has won university and national teaching awards for her educational expertise in Speech Pathology. She is a Fellow of Speech Pathology Australia and a Principal Fellow of the Higher Education Academy.

Research Internship Program

The Research Internship Program began in 2021 and aims to provide registered nurses and midwives with an opportunity to develop their knowledge and skills in research. Supported by the Office of the Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer, Interns are seconded from their employing division within the ACT Health Directorate on a 0.5FTE basis for a period of 12 months, to SYNERGY: Nursing and Midwifery Research Centre. During the 12-month placement, Interns complete the Graduate Certificate in Research with the University of Canberra, completing a research project that aims to be relevant to their clinical service area. Interns are provided with mentorship and support from the Clinical Chairs in Midwifery and Nursing.

3. Honours Scholarships

The Bachelor of Midwifery (Hons) and Bachelor of Nursing (Hons) programs are offered to high performing graduates of the Bachelor of Midwifery or Bachelor of Nursing degree. The program involves a supervised research thesis which is undertaken over one-year full time or two-years part time. Most students undertake the program on a part time basis alongside employment in their graduate year or beyond.

The ACT Health Directorate, through the Office of the Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer, began offering scholarships to graduate midwives in 2013 and nurses in 2015. Midwives and nurses are provided one day per week (funded by the Office of the Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer) to undertake the Honours program over two years, alongside their employment. Their research project is negotiated with senior health service staff members to ensure it is relevant and useful to the service whilst also within the scope of the Honours program.

The motivation for this program was to attract high performing graduates to ACT Health, beginning with the Centenary Hospital for Women and Children and in more recent years including Calvary Public Hospital Bruce. Graduates completing the program have high level skills and knowledge in project management, evidence-based practice, research methods and communicating research findings. Graduates from the Honours program are well equipped not only to undertake further research, but to lead quality improvement and other projects, critically appraise evidence for practice, and develop clinical policies.
